By enhancing the collective capability of farmers. Farmers can adopt innovative and business-oriented practices thanks to FPOs' facilitation of access to high-quality inputs, institutional credit, training, and market connections. Additionally, they encourage value addition, processing, and the application of contemporary technologies, all of which boost output and profitability. Farmers are encouraged to engage in entrepreneurship by the collective approach, which lowers risks and increases bargaining power. However, issues like poor infrastructure, limited managerial expertise, and financial limitations still limit their performance.

INTRODUCTION

Agriculture plays vital role in the Indian economy. About 54.6%of the total workforce engaged in Agriculture. Yet the GVA of the agriculture is

18.4% of India GVA at current prices during 2022-2023 (Department of Agriculture and farmers, welfare). Agriculture in India is gradually shifting from subsistence farming to

a more business-oriented approach. In this transformation, Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) play an important role. FPOs are collectives of farmers who come together to improve their economic strength through better access to inputs, credit, technology, and markets. One of the most significant contributions of FPOs is promoting agri-entrepreneurship among their members. By eliminating the need for middlemen, FPOs allow farmers to combine their produce, reach wider markets, and obtain higher prices. In addition to raising revenue, this cooperative strategy inspires farmers to investigate business ventures including value addition, processing, packaging, and direct selling. They offer farmers technical assistance and training in areas such as marketing tactics, financial planning, and company management. Members gain confidence and entrepreneurial abilities as a result. FPOs serve as a catalyst for agri-entrepreneurship by fostering innovation, lowering risks, and strengthening market connections.

What is Agri-Entrepreneurship?

An Agri entrepreneur concentrates on increasing output, cutting expenses, improving product quality, and gaining access to better markets. The application of entrepreneurial concepts, such as creativity, risk-taking, and business management, to agricultural and related industries is known as agri-entrepreneurship, or agri-entrepreneurship. It entails finding opportunities, creating value, and effectively managing resources to turn conventional farming into a successful, market-driven business. Agri-entrepreneurship refers to the process where farmers adopt innovative and business-oriented approaches in agriculture and allied sectors. It includes activities like value addition, processing, packaging, marketing, and agribusiness ventures such as dairy, poultry, fisheries, and agri-startups. Agri-preneurship is directly

marketed, sustainable, and focused on the community (Nair,2017).

Role of FPOs in Promoting Agri-Entrepreneurship

The term "Farmer Producer Organization" (FPO) is a general term for farmer-producers' organizations that are incorporated or registered under Part IXA of the Companies Act or the Co-operative Societies Act of the relevant States. These organizations are created with the intention of utilizing economies of scale in the production and marketing of agricultural and related sectors. The idea behind Farmer Producer Organizations is that farmers, who produce agricultural goods, may organize into organizations (PIB, Government). FPO's primary goal is to provide producers with more revenue through their own organization. Farmer Producer Organizations serve as a catalyst for agripreneurship by changing the agricultural sector into a more structured, market-oriented, and sustainable enterprise system, Through creating an environment that encourages FPOs enable farmers to go from subsistence farming to profitable businesses through capacity building, input access, technology distribution, and market connections. This change fosters rural resilience and sustainable farming methods in addition to raising revenue levels (Singh & Singh, 2018). The specific role of FPO are as Follows-

- 1. Capacity Building and Skill Development:** Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) use exposure trips, workshops, and training to improve farmers' abilities. They develop managerial abilities including marketing, finance, and company planning as well as technical expertise in better agricultural techniques.
- 2. Access to Credit and Financial Support:** By assisting farmers in obtaining grants,

loans, and subsidies, Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) enhance access to financing. They save expenses by buying inputs in bulk, offer financial advice, and encourage financial literacy to improve resource management.

3. Input Supply at Lower Cost:

FPOs procure inputs like seeds, fertilizers, and pesticides in bulk and provide them to members at affordable rates. This reduces production cost and increases profit margins. In order to provide prompt and reasonably priced access to high-quality agricultural inputs including seeds, fertilizers, insecticides, and farm equipment, FPOs are essential.

4. Market Linkages and Better Price Realization:

By facilitating group sales, drawing in bigger purchasers, and lowering reliance on middlemen, Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) improve price realization. Through access to remote and digital marketplaces, they enhance pricing transparency and solidify market ties.

5. Value Addition and Processing:

By facilitating tasks like cleaning, grading, packaging, and branding, Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) facilitate small-scale processing of goods including fruits, dairy, pulses, and spices, assisting farmers in improving quality and boosting revenue.

6. Risk Reduction and Collective Strength:

FPOs help members in sharing production and market risks by encouraging group action. They lessen financial risk by enabling mass purchases of materials at reduced prices. They assist farmers in managing uncertainty through connections with government programs, finance institutions, and insurance plans.

7. Promotion of Innovation and Technology:

By giving people access to better seeds, machinery, digital tools, and

contemporary techniques, Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) encourage the use of technology. By working together, they lower expenses and hazards, assisting farmers in increasing profitability, efficiency, and production.

Challenges Faced by FPOs

The efficacy of Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) in fostering agri-entrepreneurship is limited by a number of issues. The majority of FPOs struggle with issues that limit their capacity to grow and endure over time, such as insufficient funding, poor governance, a lack of qualified management, and inadequate infrastructure. (Srivastava et al.,2022). Inadequate managerial and technical abilities are a significant problem as many FPO executives are not professionally skilled in marketing, financial management, or business planning. Their efficacy is dependent not just on economic performance but also on management skill, institutional coherence with supporting agencies, and the quality of governance (Jose and Chathukulam, 2025) . To fully exploit the potential of FPOs in promoting agripreneurship, these challenges must be resolved.

CONCLUSION
